For some of us we think of November as having darker mornings, early sunsets and shortened days. Or maybe we anticipate Daylight Saving time; crisp frosty mornings with the sun shining through the colorful leaves on the trees. November is a transition month because it also includes the warm hazy days of Indian summer that commonly fall between the eleventh and twentieth of the month. There is a lot happening in November, but more than anything I think everyone sees November as the month when we celebrate Thanksgiving, that national holiday so rich in traditions.

Thanksgiving really is full of tradition when many of us are preparing to celebrate with family and sometimes friends. This summer in Greece, a new government was elected promising to reform policies regarding refugees and migrants. The new prime minister has prioritized reinforced order



protection, fast asylum procedures, and improved living conditions for refugees. Already they have implemented several decisions which target refugees and migrants. Unfortunately, these measures have only served to make life more difficult for refugees, and for those trying to help them.

One of the most troubling resolutions was to stop issuing social security numbers to new arrivals, which would have given them the right to work, access to public healthcare, and free transportation.

We appreciate your prayer for us in this season. Pray that God would give us wisdom to use our time, energy, and other resources in the best, most helpful way. Since many of the larger NGOs (non-government organizations) have already pulled out of Greece, the responsibility now falls on smaller organizations like us.

Friends of ours in Kenya used to be on staff at Valley Church in West Des Moines. This church sent teams to Kenya in past years to help lead a women's conference for missionary women. When this church heard that we were moving to the Des Moines area, they offered to take back our extra bags (saving us a lot of money).

Both Jaden and Josiah had a midweek morning program at Valley Church

for their ages that they attended the week we moved. Jaden made some instant connections and asked if this could be our new church. This was the final nudging that God gave us, that this was the church he was leading us to.

We had prayed for new friends, and to be known.

In our first week in Iowa, a family invited us out for lunch after church to a brick oven pizza restaurant.



We had prayed for new friends for Jaden and Josiah. After a few days of moving in we discovered some neighborhood kids that were similar in age to our boys. Within a few weeks our boys were making new friends and getting invited to a birthday party. God was answering our prayers in very clear ways. They have also adjusted well to their new school, Des Moines Christian School, for which we are extremely thankful.

The last month, I (Mark) have traveled all over Iowa to survey the current Young Life areas and pray that God would reveal to me his plans for new areas in the year ahead. I have met most of the Young Life staff in our region and went on a fall retreat with them a few weeks ago.
